

ON MY MIND: CHRISTMAS COMES ONCE AGAIN

Around this time of year, Neil and I get into an argument discussion about when to put up the Christmas tree. Despite being a pastor committed to the preservation of the season of Advent, as soon as the Thanksgiving dishes are cleared, I'm ready to deck the halls. Luckily, we are hosting two Christmas parties early in December, so the tree will be up at our house before the first Advent candle is lit.

One of my favorite parts of decorating is unpacking all the ornaments, most of which we won't even put on the tree. (There simply isn't room.) Many ornaments remind me of people who have died. There are three "baby's first Christmas" ornaments engraved with the names of our children, gifts from Neil's parents, who are both gone. There is a sweet snowman ornament made by a cousin who died in her 50s. There are delicate snowflakes, crocheted by my Grandmother Ruby.

Other ornaments remind me of a particular place and time. There was the Christmas in Connecticut when we lived in a parsonage built in 1840 with floors so uneven that the tree fell down - twice. (See cracked silver balls for reference.) There was the Christmas in our first house. (Hallmark ornament "home for the holidays" circa 2000.) There was the Christmas when my mom helped us make ornaments with string, glue and glitter (as seen in *Ladies Home Journal*, December, 1970). That's the beautiful thing about Christmas: it is a still-point in time. December 25th comes around once a year and, with it, the memories and emotions of Christmases past.

Long before Halloween became a popular holiday, it was the custom to tell ghost stories at Christmastime. The winter solstice was thought to create a thin place between this world and the next, giving spirits a chance to return to earth. This was especially popular in the Victorian era. Why do you think Marley visits Ebenezer Scrooge on Christmas Eve? While I've never been visited by the ghost of Christmas past during this season, I have picked up an old ornament and suddenly been reminded of a loved one who has died. I see them as they were, I remember all the ways they blessed my life, and I am full of love.

That's the power of Christmas. It's a season of hope, peace and joy – but the greatest of these is love. The love we have shared with others is a reminder of the great love God shares with each and every one of us in Jesus Christ.

May God bless you in this Advent and Christmas season with good memories and great love!

Preschool Classroom Communities

In the Preschool we try to make most of our values short and sweet so that they are easy to remember. Every year, the children in each classroom learn about their classroom responsibilities. Where age-appropriate, these are: Respect for Self, Respect for Others, and Respect for our Classroom and all that is in it. This philosophy works well by playing into young children's desire to respect their classrooms by being helpful and making meaningful and positive contributions.

The Preschool's curriculum breaks down daily events into two categories: Routines and Experiences. The Experiences are the child-led, adult-facilitated daily content of the lesson plans. The Routines are the events that take place almost every day: the predictable events that follow each classroom's daily schedule so that children know what to expect. One thing the children expect is to have an important role in facilitating the day's routines.

Helping to take care of the classroom is a part of every day's routine. It makes children feel powerful and important members of the group. In these photos, a group of four-year-olds help fold washcloths; a three-year-old helps her teacher take grapes off the vine in preparation for nutrition break; and a group of children builds a block fence to assist in watching over Muir the hedgehog, while their teacher cleans his cage.





ENGAGING IN A MORE SUSTAINABLE CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY SEASON

Those traveling or hosting for the holidays can take some actions to make this a more sustainable Christmas celebration. Some of the steps may be more easily done than others. But if we all follow at least a few of the steps, we can work toward making this a "most sustainable" holiday season.

For those traveling, consider driving at a lesser rate of speed. Whenever possible, drive at 55 miles per hour. Of course, any speed driven under the posted speed limit helps reduce the use of fossil fuel.

If you are caught in the dilemma of using a plastic tree versus cut or live, and want to make the Christmas tree tradition more ecofriendly, go for an artistic one made of wood. Enjoy the creativity of the artisans and the simplicity of a "tree" that is natural, easy care, and long-lasting.

Those hosting Christmas gatherings this year may want to consider replacing your older Christmas tree strings of lights with new LED lighting. This will result in instant and long-term energy savings.

When it comes to exchanging gifts, consider using and reusing gift bags rather than wrapping paper. While it might be fun to rip and tear into a wrapped present, the fancy paper itself is most likely to be laminated with plastic, foil, glitter, or other non-paper materials that contaminate a recycle bin. The short fibers in tissue paper make it unrecyclable too.

Consider giving Fair Trade presents. Buying Fair Trade provides the creators—farmers, laborers, and artisans—fair prices and stable incomes, reduces poverty, betters working conditions, and promotes environmentally sustainable practices. It's a just and good deal for all!

Give presence, not just presents. Give an adventure, an experience that can be shared, talked about, and remembered long after the usual "stuff "has been covered over in the landfill.

Focus on reducing holiday food waste, which is a key driver of climate change according to the Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC). The CEC says that once food waste ends up in a landfill, it creates methane, a greenhouse gas that is 25 times more potent than carbon dioxide. In fact, if global food waste were measured as a country, it would be the world's third worst emitter of greenhouse gases according to the CEC. Send leftovers home with guests after a gathering. Take your own takeout container when you meet friends for a dinner out. Composting at home is always a good idea.
