What is your earliest memory of money? Maybe a parent gave you some change to buy a snack at a baseball game. Maybe a family member handed you a dollar to place in an offering plate during church. Or maybe you earned a little money doing extra chores so you could save up for something special.

We each have many memories and stories about how we learned what money is, how it worked, and what it can do. We have stories about times when money made us anxious or when just the right amount of money seemingly came out of nowhere. We have stories about jobs, paychecks and saving up for big items.

Despite money's centrality in our lives, we're not all that good at talking about it. Along with politics and religion, it's one of the things we're told not to bring up at the dinner table. But what if instead of avoiding talking about



money we decided to simply reframe the way we think about money? After all, money and possessions are one of the most common topics in all of scripture. Jesus talked about money more than faith and prayer. Our money story, therefore, is a spiritual story.

Starting Wednesday, September 20 at 6:30 p.m. I will lead a six-part financial wellness course called "Saving Grace." This program, which was created through the United Methodist Church, approaches saving, earning, giving, spending and debt from a Christian perspective. This is not a class on how to get rich quick nor is this a one-size-fits-all approach to finance. This program can help people no matter where they are in their lives or careers. Throughout the course, participants will learn how to create personal spending, saving, and giving plans with their religious and spiritual commitments in mind.

I truly believe that through honest conversations and remembering God's faithfulness and grace, we can shift our relationship with money. We can start to pull apart and explore some of our anxiety and move toward true financial wellness.

Shannon Craigo-Snell is a systematic Christian theologian. Since 2011, she has served as professor of theology at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, where she teaches Masters and Doctor of Ministry students as they engage in multiple forms of ministry. Before arriving in Louisville, she was associate professor of Religious Studies at Yale University, where she taught undergraduates, masters students, and Ph.D. students. In all of her work, Shannon Craigo-Snell brings the wisdom of theology into conversation with contemporary issues so that each might teach and learn from the other. Embracing collaborative learning, she has co-authored one book with a pastor, co-authored another book with an activist, and coauthored articles with a liturgical theologian. Her areas of interest focus on feminist and Reformed theologies, theology and theater, anti-racism, and ecclesiology. Beneath these subjects is the larger need to rethink what it

means to be human together today. In 2014, Shannon Craigo-Snell was ordained as a minister in the Presbyterian Church (USA). Since then she has been invited to teach workshops and lead worship in churches across the country.

HENRY & ANNABEL LARZELERE MEMORIAL LECTURE

The Peoples Church is hosting Kristin Kobes Du Mez for our annual Henry & Annabel Memorial Lecture on Sunday, November 12. Du Mez is a New York Times bestselling author and Professor of History and Gender Studies at Calvin University. She holds a PhD from the University of Notre Dame and her research focuses on the intersection of gender, religion, and politics. She has written for The New York Times, The Washington Post, NBC News, Religion News Service, and Christianity Today, and has been interviewed on NPR, CBS, and the BBC, among other outlets. Her most recent book is 'Jesus and John Wayne: How White Evangelicals Corrupted a Faith and Fractured a Nation.'

Kristin will begin her time with us by giving a brief presentation during the 10:30 a.m. worship service, and then will give her full lecture, 'Jesus and John Wayne and the Evangelical Reckoning,' at 1 p.m. This free event is open to anyone who would like to attend, and all are welcome.



The Henry and Annabel Larzelere Memorial Lecture Series was established in 2017 to honor Henry and Annabel Larzelere's interest in continuing education on topics of international interest and theological thought. Henry and Annabel moved to East Lansing in 1938 where Henry was a new faculty member in the College of Agriculture at Michigan State University. They promptly joined The Peoples Church and became involved in the church community as well as in greater Lansing where they were active in a variety of civic activities. Henry and Annabel were world travelers who were always building bridges of hope and understanding. Our desire is that these lectures will inspire and strengthen us to serve with compassionate love as we strive to build a more just and peaceful world.

FINE ARTS COMMITTEE

The Fine Arts Committee has announced the installation of its latest exhibit, "Where ART Thou?? –Playful Reflections on Religion and Scripture," by local artist and TPC member Chance Liscomb. The exhibit will be installed on September 7 and be on display throughout the halls bordering the church Sanctuary, the Kiosk in the Rotunda and Friendship Hall until December 7.

Chance is a versatile assemblage sculptor with a specialization in working with metal and wood. Along with some of his more familiar works, this show includes assemblages that highlight various messages from the Bible and provide a tongue-in-cheek look at religious ceremony, scripture and pomp and circumstance. With a range of whimsical to seriousness, the goal of the show is to inspire, contemplate, and strengthen faith through good Christian humor and folly.

In explaining the inspiration for his exhibit, Chance notes, "I love the Lord and God and the Holy Spirit completely. I love the truth and the way and the light. I know God had a grand sense of humor and to me, humor is a great tool to get people to laugh, let go and move on.



"My intentions are to have a humorous show about religion and how we see passages in the Bible and how they are interpreted and understood. My desire is to make light of things and get viewers to lighten up and laugh.

"I have thought about the concept for this exhibit for many years and am grateful for the opportunity to bring it to life here at The Peoples Church."

Chance was born in Richmond, Virginia and grew up in the Shenandoah Valley. His parents, both artists, influenced and inspired him as a child. In 1990, he earned a Bachelor of Arts in speech communications from George Mason University. Shortly thereafter, he joined the United States Peace Corps serving in Mali, West Africa, from 1991-1993. Upon completion of his service, he returned to George Mason and earned a Master of Arts in education. In 1996, he went abroad for three years to teach art at the America School of Las Palmas, Gran Canaria, Spain. Upon returning stateside, Chance taught high school art education while furthering his education at Virginia Commonwealth University. There he earned a Master in Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies, specializing in sculpture and painting. Post-graduation, he served as an adjunct professor in art education at Lord Fairfax Community College.

Chance has exhibited his sculptures and paintings throughout the U.S. and abroad. He has created many commissioned pieces and works independently with galleries, collectors, organizations and communities throughout Michigan and Virginia.
