ON MY MIND: TENDING A STRANGER'S GARDEN

2019 will go down as a year of transitions. My husband Neil and I sold our home of 11 years last December, and I moved into a small condo around the corner. It was painful to say goodbye to the home where we raised our children, but the worst part of selling our house was giving up our garden. The yard was finally in good shape with a designated herb garden and raised beds for growing vegetables. It took us years to amend the heavy Ohio soil and we were finally enjoying bumper crops of tomatoes and beans. It was hard to say goodbye and frankly I didn't know how I would adjust to a life without a garden.

The condo complex I moved into had a beautiful garden that ran the length of the building on the south side. There was a rolling green lawn dotted with benches, and along the edge of the grass, there were plots marked out with pavers and stones. I had asked the building manager if it was possible to get a garden plot, and was told the plots were jealously held by long term residents. "New residents have to be on a waiting list," the manager said. I resigned myself to a garden-less summer. Then a miracle happened. In February, I was walking by the condo manager's office and I overheard the chair of the garden committee fretting about the need for more gardeners. I poked my head in and said, "Are you really looking for more gardeners? I would love to have a garden plot." The woman perked up and said, "That's wonderful! A couple in the building recently had to give up gardening due to health reasons. There are three plots that need tending if you're interested." I said yes without a second thought. And that is how I ended up tending a stranger's garden last summer.

When you "inherit" a garden, you don't know what to expect. It was March before I got a good look at my new garden. The plots were barren and unpromising. There were a couple of old tools moldering in a pile, pieces of wire and tubing sticking out of the ground, and clumps of dead plants indicating where flowers once bloomed. It was quite a mess and I considered digging everything up so I could start fresh in the spring. But something told me to wait and see what might come up in time. What a surprise! There were star lilies and blue irises, white peonies and pink tea roses, as well as mint, bee balm and catnip. By the first of May, I could see what the garden had to offer and where I could make it my own. I noticed what needed to be thinned, what needed to be fertilized, and what needed to be pruned. I found the perfect place for tomatoes and thyme, basil and marigolds, tarragon and sage. I couldn't always tell if a plant was a weed or a flower, so I learned to be patient. And that is the key: that strange garden had wonderful gifts to offer—but I had to be patient in order to receive them.

Being the new pastor is like tending a stranger's garden: one has to be patient and pay attention. I've only just arrived at The Peoples Church and I can already see some of the gifts and graces in this community. The congregation is warm and welcoming, the staff is talented and helpful, and the building and grounds are remarkable. I am full of fresh ideas for worship, programming and ministry. I can't wait to share them...but first I need to take time to get to know you and see what is already growing here. Like last summer's garden, I need to be patient lest I miss something wonderful that is waiting to appear. In time, we will figure out what needs to be thinned, what needs to be fertilized, and what needs to be pruned. In time, we will discern what new seeds God has planted in our midst as we seek to be the body of Christ in this moment. It just takes a bit of patience.

The 18th century hymn, "We Plough the Fields and Scatter" speaks of God as the original gardener, the One who sends the snow in winter, the warmth to swell the grain, the breezes and the sunshine, and soft refreshing rain. Yes, we plough the fields and scatter the grain (or plant the bulbs and sew the beans), but the truth is all the bounty of the earth is a gift to us from God. Seen from this perspective, everyone tends a stranger's garden...and all of life is that garden. May we have the patience to discern what to thin, when to fertilize and where to prune. May we appreciate all the blessings we did not earn and the blossoms we did not plant. And may we lift our voices and sing together:

We thank you, then, Creator, for all things bright and good, The seed time and the harvest, our life, our health, and food; No gifts have we to offer, for all your love imparts, But that which you desire - our humble, thankful hearts.

I give thanks to God for calling me to this community and I look forward to a long and fruitful ministry as your senior pastor.

May God's enduring love be with us all in this new season!

ROASTED ROOT VEGETABLES

INGREDIENTS:

1 1/4 lb turnips

1 1/4 lb parsnips

1 1/4 lb carrots

1 1/4 lb sweet potatoes

1 1/4 lb rutabagas

Your favorite Italian salad dressing

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F
Peel and cut vegetables into I/2 inch pieces;
divide between 2 roasting pans; pour Italian
salad dressing over vegetables and toss to coat
Roast until vegetables are tender and golden,
stirring occasionally, about 40 minutes.
Even better tasting the next day, just re-heat.
Can also be made ahead & frozen until ready to use.

Mass migration, and the problems associated with it, have directly abetted the rise of populist parties in Europe. Opposition to immigration was the prime driver of support for Brexit, it brought a far-right party to the German Bundestag for the first time since the 1950s, and propelled Marine Le Pen to win a third of the vote in the French presidential election. In addition to calling for stronger borders, however, these parties are invariably illiberal, anti-American, anti-NATO and pro-Kremlin, making their rise a matter of serious concern for the national security interests of the United States.

NEW ART EXHIBIT: 'THE RAINMAKERS'



The Fine Arts Committee has installed a new and unique exhibit, "The Rainmakers," that both informs and inspires. It features the work of artist and teacher, Guillermo Delgado, and a variety of Community Engagement Students from the MSU Residential College in the Arts and Humanities. It also includes work by a number of incarcerated individuals from correctional facilities throughout Mid-Michigan. The display includes five acrylic paintings by Guillermo along with an array of ink drawings, water color portraits, and illustrated poetry—paper booklets known as 'zines—that were created by incarcerated youth and men. "The Rainmakers" is on display in the West Hall



outside the Sanctuary, the Thompson case and the Kiosk located in the East Hall, adjacent to the Rotunda.

Guillermo is an Academic Specialist in Community and Socially Engaged Arts and Humanities at Michigan State University. He teaches art, poetry, contemplative practices (yoga, meditation) and community engagement courses. The exhibit grew out of the artist's *Prison Poetry & 'Zine Project*, which mounts poetry and art workshops in six different Michigan correctional facilities including the juvenile detention center in Lansing. The goal of the project is to help make incarcerated individuals feel more human again by providing a safe and encouraging venue for self-expression.

Guillermo's five oil paintings in the exhibit were inspired from his self-care and creative ritual of drawing and painting small mandellas at the end of the day, especially after teaching in correctional facilities. He teaches in prisons two to three times a week. "This artistic practice allows me to contemplate the lingering emotions, words and ideas in mindful and meaningful ways," he explains. "The paintings are meditations, a kind of map that allows me to re-center and begin to create order in a sometimes chaotic world."

As an interdisciplinary artist and educator, Guillermo strives to create safe, accessible and mindful learning opportunities wherever he goes. "I'm not saying art will save you," he says, "but as humans, we need hope to survive and excel. Art is hope, and hope allows us to imagine something better for our world."

You can learn more about "The Rainmakers" and Guillermo's work on the *Prison Poetry & 'Zine Project* when he comes to speak during the Peoples Forum in the Robertson Room on November 24, 2019 at 9:30 am. The exhibit will remain on display through January 16, 2020.
