"WHO NEEDS CHURCH?"

Every now and then, it's good to be reminded of why we do what we do. For Leigh and me, our Memorial Day visit with our granddaughter, Cora (almost age 3), made us realize again why we are in ministry: It's because we want children like Cora to find strong churches when they grow up.

It's easy for us to assume that there will always be plenty of active churches around; that's certainly true in mid-Michigan today. Anyone who wants to be part of a congregation can choose from dozens—all sizes, all denominations, all styles of worship. Why wouldn't the same be true 10 years from now when Cora is ready to confirm her place

in the church? Or 25 or 30 years from now, when Cora is ready to start a family of her own, why wouldn't there still be plenty of faith-and people-filled churches across the region? The best answer I can give to that—albeit a cautionary one—is to take a look at the country of my birth. When my parents left the Netherlands in 1956 with their own adorable baby (me) and my two brothers, the Dutch church was strong; in fact, they learned of the opportunity to come to America through their local congregation. But a generation later, whenever Leigh and I go back to the Netherlands, we find more and more churches closed with signs on the door that say, "Geen Dienst" (no services). In addition to that, almost none of my cousins or other close relatives have any connection to the church.

It would be naïve to think that the same couldn't happen here. Sadly, (in this case), America follows many trends that begin in Europe. It isn't hard to imagine an America with fewer and fewer churches, where worship attendance has fallen to the single digits, and where newborn infants are raised apart from the church experience of their grandparents. But we can also imagine a country experiencing spiritual renewal, with plenty of churches ready to welcome every new child.

That's the future Leigh and I want for Cora, and for all of our grandchildren. It's one of the reasons why we are in ministry, and why we hope that you, too, will be strong in your church involvement. Our children need you!







Sensory materials are not only fun for children, they provide unique opportunities for development across all learning domains.

Cognitive Development

As children experiment with different sized containers with sensory materials, they develop math skills such as size, conservation, counting, timing (how long it takes the sand to sift vs. the dirt), matching (finding the same size or shape buttons), and classifying and sorting (what are buttons, bottle caps, gems). As children manipulate the materials, they learn to understand concepts such as more/less, full/empty and sink/float.

Science concepts such as cause and effect (what happens when water is added to dirt), gravity (water comes down the funnel not up), and solid to liquid (sand and water mixture) are also explored.

Children have the opportunity to work on their problem-solving and decision-making skills as they determine how they are going to use the materials. For example, children decide how to build a boat that will float, how to turn the whipped cream green, or how to make the sand stick together.

Language Development

Sensory experiences are fun to talk about. They are exciting because each child can use the materials differently. Children also develop pre-writing skills as they pour, spoon, grasp, and work on eye-hand coordination tasks as they use the materials.

Social and Emotional Development

Sensory experiences provide children with the opportunity to feel good about their decision-making skills—they control their actions and the experience. Self-discovery occurs as children become eager scientists. They take pride in their predictions, make observations, and respond to their findings. In addition, children learn to cooperate and work together around the sensory table.

Physical Development

Children reinforce and practice their small motor skills while pouring, measuring, stirring, whisking, and manipulating the materials. They learn to control their bodies and give their bodies directions to accomplish tasks as they explore.

Creative Development

Sensory experiences provide open-ended opportunities where the process is more important than the product —how children use the materials is much more important than what is made with them.
