LIVE LIKE GRACE

My grandmother Grace had a card on her desk that said, "Women are like tea: you never know how strong they are until you put them in hot water." She knew something about hot water – having raised seven children during the Depression in South Dakota. One of my favorite Grace stories is about the day her youngest boys knocked over the china cabinet. Don (my father) and David were running around the dining room and one of them (my dad swears it was not him) knocked one of the legs out. The whole cabinet fell over with a deafening crash. Grandma ran into the room and found that every dish she owned—including her wedding china—had been smashed to bits.

You may wonder how my grandmother punished her sons for this act of destruction. I can't tell you, because that was never part of the story Grace told. Her story was about how she replaced those dishes. My Grandmother Grace threw a fancy tea party and invited all her friends. The price of admission was one complete place setting of dishes. It didn't matter if it was fancy china or everyday dishes—you just needed to bring a plate, a bowl, a cup and a saucer. The party was a grand success; Grandmother ended up with a magnificent set of dishes—one set for every day, and another set of fine china. She didn't mind that it wasn't a perfectly matched set, because each setting represented the love and care of a friend.

The season of Lent begins early this year. We begin the 40-day journey on February 17, Ash Wednesday, when we will virtually mark ourselves with the sign of the cross. We will remind ourselves that we are dust and to dust we shall return. It is a somber season, a season of self-reflection and discernment, a season of stripping away what is not necessary so we can refocus ourselves on what is essential.

The power of Ash Wednesday is that it reminds us that we are mortal. No matter how much we pretend we are in control or self-reliant, the truth is we are finite, fragile, and (as Shakespeare put it) subject to "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune." Ash Wednesday reminds us that one day we will die, which shatters our illusions of power and self-importance the way two young boys can shatter an entire collection of china. What we do in response to that shattering is the work of Lent.

When I think about my Grandmother Grace and the struggles she faced in her life, I always remember the story of her china. She could find joy in times of sorrow and potential in times of destruction. Grace was a life-long Methodist and her faith was the central narrative of her life. My goal is to be more like Grace each and every day. When life shatters my fragile illusions of control, my goal is to be like Grace and set my feet on the solid foundation of God's presence and love, one place setting at a time.

THE MANY BENEFITS OF PUZZLES AND PIECES

TO THE RESIDENCE OF THE PARTY O

Around the age of one year, children begin to move beyond interacting with objects by tasting and shaking them, into a stage of manipulating those objects with improved hand-eye control. At Peoples Church Preschool the children are provided with a variety of objects each day that can be manipulated. These include both stacking and interlocking pieces, such as those shown in the adjacent photo.

Puzzles can be flat or three-dimensional. When a child works with these materials, the following skills are being practiced:

Cognitive skills

- Understanding the surrounding world—there is no better way for your child to gain an
 understanding of the world around them than by letting them literally manipulate the world
 around them.
- Problem solving—either the piece fits or it does not. Children use critical thinking skills to reach their goal.

Emotional skills

• Patience—puzzles are not like sports, you can't just step up to the plate and swing until you knock it out of the park. You must practice patience and slowly work through the puzzle before you reach the ending.

Physical skills

- Hand-Eye Coordination—your child will develop a keen relationship between what their eyes see, what their hands do and what their brain relates to this information.
- Fine Motor Skills—small and precise movements, such as the movement of fingers to get a piece in exactly the right spot, are built and can lead to better handwriting and typing skills.

REV. SWARTZ RECEIVES MINISTER EMERITUS HONOR

Rev. Swartz was ordained by the National Association of Congregation Christian Churches in 1995. After two successful pastorates, she was called to serve The Peoples Church as Associate Pastor in 2002. Rev. Swartz brought excellence and enthusiasm to all her pastoral duties, serving us faithfully until her retirement in 2013. During her tenure with The Peoples Church, she not only served as Associate Pastor, but also stepped in to be the Interim Senior Pastor for a year following Reverend Dr. Harry Johnson's retirement.

During her time at The Peoples Church, Rev. Swartz focused her energies and gifts on pastoral care. She provided leadership in the organization and implementation of Stephen Ministry, the Caring Ministry and the Grief Recovery program. She was also instrumental in incorporating spiritual direction practices into the ministry of the church. As a certified Spiritual Director, Rev. Swartz helped create the long-running TPC Women's Spirituality Group and the Upper Room-inspired Companions in Christ, a covenant group that has met for over a decade.

Another important part of Rev. Swartz's ministry was teaching. She developed and led a variety of programs for Lent, Advent and WNL! with topics ranging from Spiritual Disciplines, Synoptic Communities, Non-Canonical Christian Communities and Writing Your Spirituality. Rev. Swartz also took an active role in mentoring pastoral interns, helping to guide and shape seminarians on the path to ordination. And though preaching was not her primary responsibility, Rev. Swartz's sermons made a significant contribution to the spiritual growth and theological education of many members of the congregation.

Rev. Swartz has served The Peoples Church with distinction and grace. Her ministry enriched the lives of church members and brought recognition to the work of The Peoples Church in the greater Lansing community. With her distinguished career and countless valued contributions to The Peoples Church, it is fitting that we honor the Reverend Penelope Swartz as "Minister Emeritus of The Peoples Church." 


Hello PCYG Students and Families!
