On My Mind: Homo proponit, sed Deus disponit



The second most widely read Christian text is *The Imitation of Christ* by the medieval Catholic priest Thomas à Kempis. Kempis was a member of the Modern Devotion spiritual movement during the late medieval period and his gift was connecting the stuff of everyday life with the life of faith.

The quotation above is from Kempis's most famous work, and it is translated as "Man proposes, but God disposes." The idea is that people can make all sorts of plans, but in the end, we do not control our lives or our destinies. You need look no further than 2021 to find the truth of this quotation.

I had many plans for 2021. When I set goals for 2021, I naively wrote, "As the pandemic draws to a close, there are some areas of ministry and mission that will bear new fruit." None of us could have known that a year later we would still be dealing with the Covid pandemic. We had other plans, didn't we?

In 1995, I had a plan. Neil and I were finishing our master's degrees and he had applied to a doctoral program in New Haven. I knew he would be admitted to the program and so I had made plans. I would take a job in the admissions office at the seminary, Walter would be enrolled in a local preschool, and we would continue to live in our cute little apartment. The plan was perfect!

Except Neil did not get admitted to that doctoral program. When he broke the news to me, I burst into tears. All my plans were ruined! What would we do?! Where would we go?! It felt like a disaster.

Then came the news that Neil had been admitted to the doctoral program at Boston University. And then came the news that there was a church in the Boston area looking for an associate minister. And then came the news that there was a sunny three-bedroom apartment available in Boston. By the time 1996 rolled around, we had a whole new life in Boston. In fact, it was a better life than I had planned in New Haven, and it set me on the path that led me to Peoples Church. Amazing!

Man proposes, but God disposes. Some people might think this is a negative statement, that humans make plans and God actively thwarts what we are trying to do. Others might think that this statement means humans have no free will. But neither of those readings is accurate.

What I think Thomas à Kempis was trying to communicate is that human plans often fall apart and not always because of circumstances beyond our control. But God's plans do not fail and when we trust in God to lead us, things work out better than we could possibly imagine.

How God is going to transform and redeem these last two years has yet to be revealed but I am trying to hold it all lightly. The grief, the disappointment, the worry, the anger, the uncertainty - I am determined to give this all to God and trust that God will do something good and new with it.

Whatever plans you have for 2022, I pray they all work out. But come what may, know that God will always be with us. Happy New Year!



Resolute?

Tis' the season for New Year's resolutions, those promises we make with great intention but often less than great follow-through. As I pondered what I hope to commit to in this coming year I looked up how this tradition got started.

Records as far back as 3000 B.C. speak of ancient Egyptians bringing in the new year with great parties. In 2000 B.C. during a 12-day festival marking the start of the farming season (March) the Babylonians would crown their king and make resolutions in hopes of gaining favor with their Gods - they vowed to plant crops, to pay their debts...to return borrowed farm equipment. This practice was later adopted by the Romans and shifted with the Julian calendar in 46 BC, declaring January 1st as the start of the new year. January was named for Janus, a two-faced Roman God (looking forward to new beginnings and backward for reflection) to whom the Romans would offer sacrifices and make promises of good behavior for the year ahead.

Perhaps you knew all of this already? There is something exciting about the possibilities that a new year brings - especially after two years of Covid separation and slow-down. We don't come at the new year making promises to God in hopes of gaining fortune or blessings, but I do hope that we enter into 2022 with intention - that we look back and reflect on what has been, as we look ahead to what we hope will be. Earth Stewardship's Monthly Green Message

The Peoples Church Earth Stewardship Committee offers an invitation and more tips to remind us to Reduce, Repair, Reuse, and Recycle. In the spirit of "Ask God's blessing on all your work, but do not also ask Him to do it" please join the Earth Stewardship team to help develop Climate Change focused meetings and events, hopefully engaging with MSU and other students since these issues greatly impact their future. Watch for upcoming events in the spring where we will host a climate change video screening event, discussion, and refreshments.

This month's focus is reducing greenhouse gases (GHGs). Did you know that 1/3 of FOOD for human consumption, generating 8% of greenhouse gases, goes to waste? If it were a country, food waste would be the third largest emitter of GHGs behind the US and China. Downsizing planned meals and using up leftovers helps, but eating less red meat is the single most impactful change a person can make. According to UC Davis, cattle are the #1 agricultural source of GHGs worldwide. Each year a single cow belches our 220 pounds of methane which is shorter lived than carbon dioxide, but 28 more times potent in warming the atmosphere. Methane gas, along with generated waste from cattle, is detrimental to the environment.

Daily doable actions to reduce energy usage: reduce streaming which is now the #1 energy guzzler in the digital world at 15% of broadband; turn off lights when leaving rooms; switch to LED lights; use a programmable thermostat to lower energy use when you're not home; wash laundry in cold water and keep those hot showers short! Preschool is Always Collecting Dana Johnson— Director, Peoples Church Preschool

It might surprise you to know, that as the Director of Peoples Church Preschool, I do not often buy toys for the children in the program. This is because products that are marketed as toys usually share three characteristics—these are: they are plastic; they do not particularly encourage a child to use their imagination; and the child becomes easily bored using them because none of us want to do the same thing over and over again, producing the same result.

What I do acquire for the children are open-ended materials. These are items that can be used for many things in many ways. For example, if plastic toy food is purchased, it can only ever be a basket of hollow plastic fruit. If the kitchen area is filled with various recyclable containers, small pine cones, reused muffin tins, small tree sections (tree "cookies"), fall colorful leaves and smooth stones, the children are able to cook and create endlessly. In addition, all of these materials can be used in other areas of the classroom, such as the Math and Science areas.

For this reason, we are always collecting, as our over 100 children daily need lots of materials to challenge their thinking,

Ispur their imaginations, and promote a sense of wonder. If you have any items we collect, now or in the future, please consider donating: clean, empty milk jugs; container caps-all sizes and colors, metal glass jar lids without sharp edges, all nature items, paper with at least one side blank, and small cast off loose parts created from your work place.



The Peoples Church Welcomes a New Hospitality Coordinator

A little about myself: I hold an Associates of Fine Art, which I received from the Kendall School of Design in 1986. There I studied Illustration Design, with a minor in graphic design. For about 24 years I worked at the Hawk Hollow Golf and Banquet Center in Bath, Michigan as the First Kitchen Manager. I left in March of 2020 due to Covid.

While at Hawk Hollow, I developed a gluten free baked goods product line: "Hawk Hollow Simply Free." Goods in this line were sold in many different stores in East Lansing, Lansing, Ann Arbor, Grand Rapids, and Brighton, and included: breads, cinnamon rolls, bagels, pies and piecrust, pizza crusts, cupcakes, sandwich buns and muffins. For the past 15 years sharing and baking gluten free food has been my passion, inspired in part, by my own food allergies: gluten, wheat, shellfish, soy, corn, and all types of fish.

I hope that in the year 2022 we will be able to produce gluten free items in the Church kitchen that we can share with all of you! I look forward to working with you all and am excited for all that will come in the new year!"
