Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. (1 Peter 4:10)

There's nothing like a good church potluck and the best ones I ever attended were in Valley City, North Dakota. I was the interim minister for a year at The Congregational Church of Valley City, and once a month they would have a "covered dish supper." Before church, women would file into the kitchen with their casseroles and crockpots, cake pans and pie tins. Then we'd go up to the sanctuary for worship, accompanied by the delicious smells wafting up from the kitchen. During the last hymn, the members of the Women's Committee would leave to set up the buffet line and make the punch. After worship, I would lead the congregation into the fellowship hall and we'd ooh and ahh over the bounty before us.

The key was to take a little bit of everything because it was all so good. Geri's spareribs were amazing, almost as good as Pat's brisket. Lucille made the best German potato salad I've ever had and Karen made something with carrots, raisins and celery seeds that was not to be missed. Homemade sauerkraut competed with twice baked potatoes, and if it was fall, Sharon would be sure to bring sesame green beans. Then there was the dessert table, covered with cakes and cookies and pies. There was Swedish plum cake and German kringle and Norwegian fattigman. One young woman, who didn't have time to cook, usually brought a package of Double Stuffed Oreos, which was the only dessert my children would eat. We would sit together and enjoy the shared meal, marveling over the food everyone had brought. Those were wonderful gatherings.

Every time I read 1 Peter 4:10, I think of those potlucks. "Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." That is literally what we did at those covered dish meals – we served each other with whatever gift we had received. No one was trying to be the best – although I will admit there was some mild competition between Geri and Pat – but we all brought the best we had to the table to feed the community.

October is Stewardship season, that time of year when we ask all our members and friends to prayerfully consider what financial gifts they will give to support the ministry and mission of the church. Some people have significant financial resources; other people have less – but every gift, every pledge, makes a difference and is much appreciated. What is important is to bring the best gift you have. It's not a competition – don't be Geri or Pat – but it is an opportunity to share the grace we have received with the beloved community. We give not out of a sense of guilt but because our gifts, gathered together, make amazing ministry possible.

Let us serve one another with whatever gifts we have received!

New Art Exhibit Showcases Powerful Array of Artistic Techniques and Images



"Dreaming Between the Lines" – a new exhibit by Williamston-based artist Bobbi Kilty, is now on display here at The Peoples Church. It includes 48 diverse pieces from the artist's collection and features five large-size canvasses created especially for the exhibit. Bobbi, who is also a TPC member, unreservedly incorporates a wide variety of materials in her artwork including spackle, layered Japanese paper, housepaint, acrylics and shed snakeskin. She is also exploring combined media in acrylic, watercolor, digital imaging, and encaustic painting. A strong connection with nature is evident throughout Bobbi's work.

Bobbi notes, "For me painting is a joyful, fulfilling process in which a strong connection with nature is evident. I find it stimulating to work with new materials and techniques, experimenting and exploring possibilities, carefully selecting which visual elements to include and which to leave out."

Bobbi Kilty is a painter in encaustic and water media as well as a distinguished arts academic who retired after 36 years as an Interior Design Educator at two universities. She was born in Tampa, Florida and has been drawing since childhood. She began her studies in the Art Department at Northwestern University, where she earned a B.A in Interior Design in 1965. She went on to complete a Master of Fine Arts degree at UCLA in 1969. Bobbi's arts education also includes participation in a program at Osaka University, Japan where she studied Sumie (contemporary Japanese brush painting). This technique is strongly evident in her artwork today. Her exhibit at The Peoples Church features a number of examples of encaustic painting, which is an ancient technique using wax blends, oil stick, collage elements, and a torch or heat gun.

"Dreaming Outside the Lines," will be on display throughout the halls bordering the Sanctuary, in the Thomsen Case across from the Library, and the Kiosk in the Rotunda until December 8. Pick up a catalog for the exhibit inside the Northwest entrance of the church.

The exhibit was installed by Fine Arts Committee Chair; Susan Nowicki, and Members; Jan Angell, Sue Mills, Mary Liechty, Jan Reed, and Kelton Reedy. They were assisted by the artist.

RE-MEMBER | PINE RIDGE

Re-Member, founded in 1998, is among the longest serving non profit organizations for the Oglala Lakota community on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. Their mission statement reads: "Responding to immediate needs, we provide resources that improve the quality of life for members of the Oglala Lakota Nation, and create meaningful opportunities to build understanding for our volunteers." Re-Member is not affiliated with any religious, political, or policy group. The Community Engagement Ministry, through the generosity of The Peoples Church, has supported this non profit organization monetarily and physically for many years. Volunteers come from all over the nation and the world during the spring and summer months and work on "The Rez", building beds, handicap ramps, outhouses, repairing homes, and tending to the community gardens. The Peoples Church has sent youth, college, and adult groups to Pine Ridge as volunteers as well as vehicles loaded with mattresses, linens, clothing, materials for building, and other supplies. More than 1100 volunteers per year visit and work at Pine Ridge, often gaining so much more than they are giving. The current projects for Re-Member include two hoop houses to extend the growing season, and Feather II, a community center with a learning kitchen and housing for volunteers. An ongoing project, providing wood for heating, is an important part of the winter season.
